



CHILDREN'S VISION HEALTH PROGRAMS

As Wisconsin is one of nine states that does not require vision screenings for preschool or school-age students, PBW and its Children's Vision Screening Partners establish essential public health practices to protect children and their vision health as they learn and grow.



School Nurses

School nurses and the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) collaborate across more than 400 school districts and private schools statewide, advancing PBW's mission through children's vision screenings and needed follow-up vision care.

High School and University Vision Screening Program 990 university and high school students were trained as Certified Vision Screeners—an impressive 12% increase from last year. These students assisted with vision screening 15,334 students throughout the state.




Early Childhood (0-3)

Prevent Blindness Wisconsin's 0-3 Program emphasizes developmental milestones crucial for detecting vision issues from birth to 3 years old. PBW's Vision Milestones workshops, fact sheets, and video clips have impacted 7,701 individuals across Wisconsin.

Head Start

Together with our Head Start partners, 16,197 at-risk children received certified vision screenings, resulting in 2,915 referrals for further vision care.



ADULT VISION HEALTH PROGRAMS

Prevent Blindness Wisconsin's Adult Vision Health Program offers a comprehensive array of services aimed at safeguarding Wisconsin adult's vision. Through public health education programs, adult vision screenings, and care navigation services, the program equips individuals with the knowledge and resources necessary to maintain optimal vision health.

With support from the Advancing a Healthier Wisconsin Endowment Fund, PBW developed culturally tailored materials to meet the vision health needs of the Southeast Asian community. This includes a toolkit and video for primary and vision care providers, reaching 607 individuals to date.



Mexican Consulate

Since 2020, the Mexican Consulate has shown unwavering dedication to promoting vision health. In response to heightened community demand, vision screenings were increased from bimonthly to monthly, benefiting 127 adults with vision screenings and referring 115 for further vision care.



Voucher Program

The VSP Vision Care Voucher Program enhances vision care accessibility for low-income, uninsured, and underinsured individuals. In its most successful year to date, the program assisted 506 clients in receiving essential vision care services.


